# Copenhagen


Michael Frayn | Directed by Carole Lovett

## 16-18 & 22-25 July at 7.30 pm, matinée on 25 July at 2.30 pm

Copenhagen is a work that continually engages the mind and sparks up new meanings and interpretations within the text. It is horrific to think that Hitler could have been given an atomic bomb and it is also horrific to realise that the Allies did get it and used it with devastating results in the war against Japan.

A meeting between the German physicist Neils Bohr and the Danish physicist Werner Heisenberg in Copenhagen in 1941 might have been the crucial factor in deciding the future of the whole world. The meeting really did happen but it was shrouded in secrecy right from the start and the dangers of being overheard by the Gestapo meant that hints, double meanings and misunderstandings abounded. Even the two protagonists seem never to have been absolutely clear as to what was said and what was intended.

Frayn puts them together once more with the added participation of Bohr's wife and helpmeet in an attempt to get at the meaning of the whole episode. After all, if they can finally understand the truth behind their meeting then they might understand themselves and we might eventually be able to understand them. This is a

## Mint

by Clare Lizzimore | Directed by Jen Dewsbury

### 11-13 & 17-20 June

A thought-provoking, moving production, the mood being set even before the play began. Entering the auditorium we were confronted with three stark brick walls, a small, brightly lit window glowing high up at the back, and in this cell sat Alan, the prisoner, waiting... yaiting... just waiting! Top marks to the director and set designer.

The passage of time was emphasised by authentic news headlines, many of them I remembered, flashed up above the set between scenes; sporting triumphs, political changes, terrorist atrocities, millennium celebrations, running from 1998 to 2006 as did the play.

Act 1, a series of short scenes, showing prison visits, one suspects infrequent, from members of his family to Alan where he learns of their ongoing life outside. These visits were rarely sympathetic and often accusatory with an underlying feeling of resentment.

Act 2, release and home. But the welcome quickly fades as the harsh reality of life with a criminal record sets in and resentment and accusation reemerge and build to a dramatic climax. The play leaves one with the question "Has the word 'forgiveness' finally disappeared from our vocabulary?"







It would be invidious to mention any one of the cast; they were all totally believable. They were not actors but real people, an aim all actors aspire to attain. However, a word of congratulation to Connie Reid who played the young Amber with every look, gesture and response so exactly right. Well done all.

Initial auditions will take place at the theatre on **Monday 13th July 2015 7.30pm** with recalls to be scheduled later if necessary. I would ask that you prepare any speech from a Shakespeare play. Should anyone arrive without, I will have a stack of speeches at hand!

#### The Play

This is one of Shakespeare's best-loved romantic comedies. Mistaken identities and deliberate trickery lead to a great deal of complication for the wonderful characters that are caught up in his play.

Orsino is in love with Olivia, but Olivia is in love with Cesario. Cesario is actually Viola, a girl dressed as a boy – don't ask! Just come and see the play! Viola is in love with Orsino. She has a twin brother, Sebastian, and they both think that the other one is dead. Meanwhile the humourless and judgemental Malvolio thinks that Olivia loves him and she really, really does not.

#### Casting

I have listed the main characters and the approximate ages that the actors need to be. When I cast, my decisions will be based on how the actors correspond in age and appearance to each other.

Sir Andrew Aguecheek 30+
Feste 30+ (must be able to sing)
Fabian 20+
Antonio 40+
Sea Captain 40+
