Starting from scratch

When we last wrote to you, we were hopeful that we might be able to pick up the shows from the 2019/20 season that were postponed so abruptly: The Love of the Nightingale, Amy's View, Orca and Under Milk Wood. Sadly, the situation has become so unpredictable that we were forced to accept that for the time being none of these plays was likely to happen in the foreseeable future, and the most appropriate approach was to start anew. With heavy hearts, therefore, we have requested refunds from all relevant publishers for these shows (which will at least help our depleted finances!) and the set of *The Love of the Nightingale* (right) will sadly be

deconstructed. We send our love and thanks to all those directors who, back in March, were at various points in preparation and rehearsal, and especially to all those who had created the Nightingale show, cut short ten days before curtain-up.

It is, of course, more than possible that any or all of these plays may feature in what we're able to present in the future; likewise, that the plays and directors we had lined up for 2020/21 might in time be able to bring their visions to the stage. However, the new limitations on gatherings (at the time of writing, 'the joy of six'...), the need to ensure that the Sewell Barn is a safe and appropriate space for audience, cast and crew alike, and much more. means that we must look afresh at what we are able to offer. We are keeping a strict eye on government guidelines, and are working hard to establish what we can and cannot do safely. We'll report back as soon as we can.

Sewell Barn Shorts

No, not drinks (the bar is closed!) but short plays.

One delightful output from lockdown, as you may remember from our June mailing, was a collaboration with Margaret Johnson of Norfolk County Council. Margaret was running online Adult Learning courses, and her students were tasked to write short plays.

The resulting Zoom session, on 9 July, was a delight, with seven Sewell Barn actors bringing the directors' words to life across seven plays. Feedback and appreciation were exchanged, and a great time was had by all.

Clare and Cassie were inspired by this to reach out to more local playwrights, and we emailed the Barn mailing list to ask for volunteers – both actors and performers. We were delighted by the enthusiastic response, and to have received nearly two dozen pieces to consider and around twenty actors to perform them. We selected 15, and split these across two evenings: 21 July and 11 August. Performances ranged from 3 to 15 minutes in length and were mostly monologues or duologues (with a couple of three- and four-handers for good measure). Thirty people were involved, as actors or writers, and sometimes both. New faces and old friends alike were in attendance. We agreed that local talent was definitely a force to be reckoned with! The performances were recorded for the authors and performers to review at their leisure.

We'd very much like to run another session, and to invite participants once more. Previous performers and authors are very welcome to volunteer again; if you'd like to join the merry gang for the first time, don't hesitate. It's all very relaxed and informal, and previous participants would, we believe, testify to the lovely atmosphere and creative delights – even when limited by the unpredictable behaviour of technology!

So: **our third Sewell Barn Shorts evening** will take place, by Zoom meeting, on **Tuesday 6 October** at 7.30pm. <u>Please volunteer as soon as possible</u>, either as performer or author.

We're looking for scripts of around 10 minutes long. This could be a scene from a one act or full length play or a stand alone duologue/monologue. It may be something you've already written or could be written for this evening.

Please send your scripts and/or notify us of your interest in performing by Monday 21 September to Cassie Tillett and Clare Williamson on artisticdirector@sewellbarn.org. We will read everything that's sent to us and choose a selection for performance. Playwrights: there will be an opportunity for feedback on the scripts at the end of the meeting. You can, of course, be both a writer and a performer – just let us know what you would like to do.

If you do not wish to perform or to contribute a piece of writing, but would like to attend as 'virtual audience', please email us as above, and we'll include you on the list when we send a link to the meeting.

Real performance at last!

She was joined by Barn stalwarts Kevin Oelrichs, Anne Giles and Jane Keidan, who treated us to some glorious renditions: ranging from Hamlet's most famous soliloquy and Jaques' observations on the seven ages of man to the less familiar Henry VIII. Every performance was created with professionalism and love, and we were reminded just how much we'd missed them!

The photograph shows the merry band in various delightful guises: Kevin as the Porter in *Macbeth*; Jane as Hecate from the same Scottish Play; Sabrina as Aaron in *Titus Andronicus*, and Anne bidding farewell in time-honoured Puckish fashion.

The performances were given in support of the Norwich Historic Churches Trust. Huge congratulations and thanks for keeping the flag flying!

Messages from lockdown

We like to stay in touch with our members and friends during these difficult times. Here are a couple of updates...

"Some Sewell Barn folk will know that the Sessions family has run workshops for children (and now adults) for many years and each year we have produced a full length play in the first week of the summer holidays with the youngsters. Next year will mark our 40th anniversary of this 'Drama Week'. Determined to have a 39th event in 2020 but feeling unable to involve young people within the existing restrictions, we hosted a socially distanced week of drama for adults and school leavers in our garden. With a party tent in case of rain, pints of sanitiser, a loo outdoors and a complicated schedule for just 6 folk at a time, we indulged our love of theatre

with activities ranging from 'talking heads' style pieces to a movement sequence reflecting an imagined board meeting. 'Searching for Drama Week 2020' became the title for the week. It was far less exhausting than our usual marathon, but we all appreciated the distraction and the opportunity to be creative. There was no performance and no audience but we filmed many of the activities and hope to piece them together in the coming months."

"I enjoyed the quiet of lockdown for about a month before I started to itch for something vaguely dramatic to do! I've been lucky to have the opportunity to run two readthrough groups discovering new plays and working with actors on techniques online. Most recently I ran the return of Summer Shakespeare at St Martins for our most successful year, raising well over a hundred pounds for the Norwich Historic Churches Trust. Last month I found myself down south with the wonderful people at the Centre for Horseback Combat on a stunt riding day learning a whole host of amazing skills including trying out some Russian trick riding. I'm hoping to return soon to try out Horseback archery. My theatre company Hard-Nosed Cow was due to launch with our remounting of The Devil at Midnight, unfortunately as with so many others

we've been postoned till March next year, however! We have 'in the works' an evening of local legends for October/November. Performed amongst the atmospheric settings of two city churches, *Footsteps in their Shadows* will take you on a journey into Norfolk's dark heart."
