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Our next production: The Father

What can we hold onto when blatant contradictions arise in what we see and hear? Is time itself playing a cruel trick on our ability to reconcile the past with the present? The play powerfully explores this journey for André, the eponymous father, largely from his perspective. A thread of humour weaves through the narrative, illuminating the darkness.

The Father was first performed in the UK in 2014 and released as a film in 2020. Both versions were lauded, winning awards for the author and leading actors, including two Oscars. The New York Times described the play as "stupendously effective and profoundly upsetting", while the Guardian praised the way that it constantly confounded expectations, "not stinting on the savagery whilst finding all the comedy in a situation that has its farcical elements even as the tragedy unfolds".

The director of this production, Chris Bealey, commented: "When I saw the UK premiere of The Father I knew immediately it was a play I wanted to direct. Zeller captures superbly the loss of self and rising sense of alarm that occur when what you know to be true seems inexplicably to change. He brilliantly draws us into André's world and changes it in front of our eyes. I am delighted by the opportunity to bring this uniquely theatrical piece to Norwich. The Sewell Barn Theatre enables the audience to feel and almost touch the actors, and presents great challenges in the staging, which I have relished."

André is played by John Dane, who has exceptionally strong and long-standing links with the Sewell Barn and Norwich theatre more widely. John's recent successes on stage have included King Lear at the Maddermarket; perhaps not coincidentally, since the two plays share many similarities in depicting the anguish of aging. He is ably supported by Jenny Belsey as his daughter Anne, Lauren Baston as his carer Laura, and Trevor Burton as Pierre, whilst Neil Auker and Jo Sessions take on the roles enigmatically described as The Man and The Woman. Tickets (£11/£10 concessions, and £5 for students on Wednesday 9 March) are available online from www.ticketsource.co.uk/sewellbarn or on 0333 666 3366. Please note that we will, for the time being, continue to limit ticket sales to 60 (out of our usual capacity of 100) for your comfort and safety (see COVID update below), so advance booking is highly recommended. Tickets can, if available, be purchased on the door, and we are able to accept cash or cards both for tickets and bar sales. NB: please note that The Father runs without an interval.

Keeping us all safe: COVID update

We greatly welcome the falling numbers of Covid infections, and the associated removal of government restrictions. Nevertheless, we continue to prioritise the health and safety of our audience, and all others involved in our productions, through the following measures:

- Audience numbers will remain at 60% of capacity for The Father, to allow for social distancing, with the request that face-coverings should continue be worn in the theatre except when consuming refreshments.
- At least two Covid vaccinations are required for actors attending auditions and subsequently performing in the theatre.

Please note: when booking tickets online via TicketSource, you may be offered 'Booking-protect' insurance. The Sewell Barn Management Committee does not consider that this insurance offers value for money for Barn productions; in particular, we will make ticket refunds directly for many of the identified risks. If you do consider that this might be suitable for you, please read the terms and conditions very carefully so that you are aware of exclusions and the documentation necessary to support any claim.

Coming soon: Edith - in the Beginning

by Karen Forbes | directed by Robert Little **21-23, 27-30 April**

Originally written for an outdoor, site-specific venue (Sutton Hoo House, Suffolk) to commemorate Edith Pretty donating the treasure to the British Museum, the play recounts the story of the excavation of the barrows and the discovery of the Anglo-Saxon burial ship. At the heart of the play, set in class-rigid 1930s England, is a very human story about the unusual friendship between self-taught archaeologist Basil Brown and his



employer Edith, a remarkable, educated woman in her own right, who served with the Red Cross in WW1 and became a first-time mother at 47.

A strong cast includes Lauren Baston as Edith, with Andy Lofthouse, Jonathan Cooke, Diane Webb and Melanie Peter, with Judi Daykin as Queen Raedwald and Chad Mason's dulcet tones in voiceover form.

Artistic Directors... going forward

We have been very fortunate that since 2016 we have had Cassie and Clare providing us with an exciting and varied programme of productions. Since then, they have entertained many audiences, with contemporary and classical, funny and sad plays. They have kept us 'afloat' in imaginative ways during the difficult and unexpected times of the pandemic, for which we are so very grateful. Sadly, their tenure comes to an end at the end of the 2022/2023 season - that is, in July 2023. We therefore need to look to the future. The management committee have the task of selecting and appointing the Artistic Director(s); this is then ratified by the Trust.

Clare has told us she would like to step down in July 2023 (although fortunately she assures us she isn't disappearing!). However, Cassie is prepared to stay on for another three-year tenure working with another person. A partnership has proved to be extremely successful in the past, offering a diverse and interesting approach. It would be ideal if we could appoint someone early so they can work with Cassie and Clare during the 2022/23 season. If you think you might be that person, please get in touch with me (chair@sewellbarn.org) and we can meet for a chat to talk about what the position entails. In common with everyone who works at the Barn, the post of AD is a voluntary one.

A note from Clare...

It's hard to believe that it's seven years since I first joined the Sewell Barn Theatre Company, having retired from teaching in July 2014. In the first newsletter I received was the announcement that Robert Little and Michelle Montague were stepping down as Artistic Directors.

A friend assured me that if I could run a Drama department in a large comprehensive school then I was more than capable of working the magic required to lead the Sewell Barn Theatre artistically. I was to discover that the jobs are very different but, as much as I loved teaching, I have also loved the role of Joint Artistic Director at the Barn. Six seasons later, I feel that it's time for me to step down and pass the baton on. There are so



many other aspects of life at the Barn that I want to get involved with and, not having that ultimate responsibility for the safe passage from rehearsal to production of 7 or 8 shows per season will give me greater flexibility.

I look forward to working with my successor during our 2022/23 season and, with Cassie as their partner, I am confident that the new partnership will continue to produce a rich and varied programme of work into the future.

... and from Cassie

I moved to Norfolk from South London with my husband Selwyn in 2005. For the first couple of years of our life here, we quietly attended many excellent theatrical productions across the county; by 2008, we decided that we wanted to make the Sewell Barn our primary theatrical home (although that hasn't stopped us supporting, and performing at, both the Maddermarket and the Great Hall as well!). Since then, I've been proud to perform in six shows and to direct or co-direct ten more (that's before we get to this year's production of Under Milk Wood, which will go into rehearsal after Easter).



I've learned so much, been supported by so many amazing people, and had so much fun with the Sewell Barn family, and if the company is happy to have me in this role for a bit longer, I'd love to work with another joint Artistic Director. It's a great privilege to facilitate a wide range of quality entertainment at such a unique venue, and to be involved in bringing forward new directors, actors, technicians and all the other vital pieces of the theatrical jigsaw; as well as enjoying the expertise and generosity of those with far more experience than I.

If you feel that you would like to share the next seasons of learning and creativity with me, with a view to receiving the baton with another volunteer in three years' time, we would be delighted to hear from you.

Some more important vacancies at the Sewell Barn Theatre

Could you help us in any of the following ways? We'd especially welcome volunteers among our actors. When you're not involved in a show on stage, there are many other ways that you can help the Barn community to flourish: prompting, front of house, stage management, technical operation and much more. And of course, please support us by <u>buying a ticket and coming to see the show!</u> Helping out when you're not on stage will ensure that audition opportunities will continue in the future.

Front of House: show staff and assistant manager

We are looking for more helpers front of house - both behind the bar and on the reception desk as stewards. As ever, we will train any newcomers. If you are an actor, but are not cast in a production, it would be good to see you front of house. The show cannot go on without help and it is a great way to get to know other actors and our audiences.

Jane Page has very successfully organised the teams for front of house for many years but needs someone to act as her second in command, with a view to taking over the organisation in 2023. The responsibilities include organising the rota of helpers for each performance and keeping the bar stocked.

Website manager

We are hugely grateful to John Holden, who as well as being a long-time member, supporter, actor and director at the theatre, and presently a trustee, has also been responsible for developing and maintaining our website for several years now. He would like to step down from this role, ideally in time for the end of the 2021/22 season in July 2022. As John has observed, "Web design has moved on a lot in the last 10 years and I think it's essential the Barn moves to a modern responsive website design, which is beyond my technical capabilities."

We have two paths open to us. If you have website design experience and would like to use your skills to implement complete redesign and overhaul, that would be very welcome. On the other hand, if you lack design skills but are confident with maintenance of an existing site, we will be able to recruit the support of our web host and technician, Tim Wheeler, to move the site into WordPress or similar, ready for regular updating.
