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Our next production: Orca

by Matt Grinter | directed by Sabrina Poole

Orca is masterful storytelling at its best. A remote fishing community is bound together by harsh conditions, isolation and age-old traditions. Such rituals help protect the island's way of life, embodying the legacy of generations passed. They also hide disturbing secrets and unspeakable truths. Described as 'an unnerving play', 'beautifully sculpted' and a 'fine, subtle and important piece of theatre' when it premiered in 2016, Orca's accolades have included the award of the Papatango New Writing Prize to its author, Matt Grinter. Sabrina Poole, the director of our production, has no doubt that Orca fully deserves such critical acclaim: "It is an inspiring and powerful piece, that draws on universal themes. Questions are asked at every turn, things that make you doubt what you think you knew before".

This production has been three years in the making. First announced in May 2019 and scheduled for 2020, it was then derailed by the pandemic. But those involved had such strong feelings about this play – developed as an ensemble piece – that they were determined to present it, no matter how long they had to wait. Sarah Jenkins plays the ostracised Maggie; Emma Smith her wistful and dreamy sister, Fan. Pip Dunn portrays their father, Joshua, a man drained of life from living on the outside. Abi Tacon is Gretchen, haunted by unspoken secrets, while Phillip Rowe is the imposing head of this isolated community.

In the summer of 1939 Britain was preparing for war but above the River Deben in sleepy Suffolk a different battle was taking place, one that revolved around a much earlier invader. When Mrs Edith Pretty invited local archaeologist Basil Brown to have a go at excavating the enormous mounds on her land, she was confident that he would find something. It was to be one of the most important finds in British archaeology. We were delighted by audience attendance and responses to this fascinating tale.

Coming soon (1): The War that Still Goes On

Adapted by John Barton from Thucydides and Plato | Directed by Immi Lea

17-18 June (Sewell Barn Theatre), 20 June (Maddermarket Theatre)

This extra production has been added to our current season, and will be performed in aid of the DEC Ukraine Appeal. It will be presented at the Barn as a rehearsed reading on Friday 17 June (7.30 pm) and Saturday 18 June (2.30 pm & 7.30 pm), also at the Maddermarket Theatre on Monday 19 June (7.30 pm) at the start of Refugee Week.



The war between Athens and Sparta began 2,400 years ago and lasted nearly 30 years. Other wars have continued ever since, with dynamics that are much the same. Thucydides wrote his history to warn future generations of the inhumanities and deceptions of conflict, and his message retains its power today. Can we ever learn from history to change our present, and what insights can drama provide into the eternal truths of human nature?

Booking arrangements for The War That Still Goes On are being finalised, through a production-specific website www.ticketsource/playforukraine (for both Barn and Maddermarket performances). At least 80% of ticket revenues will support the DEC Ukraine Appeal, with customers choosing whether to pay £5, £10 or £20. We expect the booking site to be fully functional by 1 June. Tickets will also be available on the door, subject to availability, at both venues.

Coming soon (2): Under Milk Wood

by Dylan Thomas | directed by Cassie Tillett

14-16, 20-23 July

"Time passes. Listen. Time passes."

The inhabitants of Llareggub are asleep. They dream. They wake. They continue to dream. They go about their daily business. This being Wales, they sing. They meet and part and disagree and weep and love and complain and rejoice. They sleep again. Their world continues to turn, as does ours.

Dylan Thomas created this extraordinary world across many years, but it was first performed as 'a play for voices' in 1953 in New York, with Thomas himself as the First Voice and the Revd Eli Jenkins. The characters are at once familiar and supernatural, hilarious and tragic, disturbing and reassuring. Thomas referred to earlier versions of the play as 'the town that was mad'; but who is to say what is 'normal', what is eccentricity and what is insanity?



Director Cassie Tillett is delighted to have assembled a first-class cast of twelve accomplished performers, most of whom will be very familiar to Sewell Barn audiences (L to R above: Selwyn Tillett, Kevin Oelrichs, David White, Thomas Monument, Mandy Kiley, Jamie Willimott, Poppy Hiscox, Carole Lovett, Jonathan Redding, Judi Daykin, Emma Kirkham). Sabrina has been a member of our theatre for several years now, as well as other venues around the city. She is known as an accomplished actor and director, as well as having great enthusiasm for set design and build, technical design and operation, and much more – in fact, every aspect of theatrical work. Her own theatre company, Hard-Nosed Cow, has created many fine performances in recent years.

Sabrina's tenure with Cassie will run for an initial three years. At the end of this time, Cassie intends to step back from the role of Joint Artistic Director (after, by that time, ten years!).

We are thrilled to welcome Sabrina to her new role, and we know that her energy, enthusiasm and experience will be of great benefit to the Sewell Barn as we move further into our fifth decade of providing quality local theatrical productions.

A sad farewell : Terry Dabbs 1931-2022

We are very sad to announce the loss of one of the longest-standing members of the Sewell Barn Theatre, a few weeks short of his 91st birthday.

Terry's performances for, and support of, the theatre date back to the very earliest days of the Barn in the 1980s. He celebrated his 80th birthday in July 2011 during rehearsals for the role of Falstaff in *The Merry Wives of Windsor*; and although he performed less often in recent years, he continued to delight audiences as the grandfather in *Festen* (2013), *Lark Rise to Candleford* (2017) and - his final performance - *Waiting in the Wings* (2019). He was highly talented, easy to work with, unfailingly reliable, and the perfect gentleman, and will be much missed by the theatre family. We send our loving condolences to his family and friends, and celebrate a long life which was so very well lived.

Chair of the Sewell Barn Trustees, Robert Little, writes:

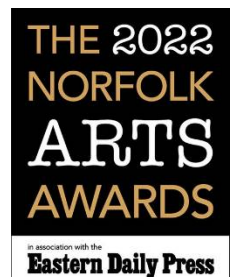
I write this with a tear in my eye because I have lost a true friend and a member of the Sewell Barn family. I've known Terry since 1973 and was enriched by his friendship for nearly fifty years. When I first came to Norfolk he was one of two older men who were to take a place in my heart and to have an enduring influence on me: Henry Burke and Terry.

We first met in our local Theatre Company in Brundall, but it was when Henry Burke asked if I knew anyone who could speak French for a part in *Henry V* at the Whiffler Theatre, Terry came to mind. It's funny, looking back at his debut for the Barn, to remember how nervous he was. The rest, as they say, is history; he would go on to become one of the most prolific actors for the company, working with so many people (just look at the Facebook tributes). For me, he was most wonderful as Newman Noggs in *Nicholas Nickleby*, probably the company's greatest achievement. He would go on to become a 'go to' actor who would never let you down and would always deliver, and was usually the first 'off book'. He could sing – *Oh What a Lovely War* and *Lark Rise to Candleford*. Then he was a first class Stage Manager: *How the Other Half Loves*, which had two sets on stage at the same time; and *On the Razzle* which would require a lot of food to be prepared every night (ask any SM and they will tell you that the mention of food sends a shudder through you). There was no doubt he was an all-rounder: he could act, sing, direct, was a scenic painter, a steward and worked behind the bar. He gave so much time to the company and always to the highest standard.

They just don't make 'em like that anymore; the likes of Terry don't come around very often. So let's cherish the many productions that he helped bring the joy of theatre into our Barn. I'm sure you will agree Terry will be missed but not forgotten. We at the Barn send our love and kind thoughts to his family at this difficult time.
