Mia is young, free and single, hasn't had sex in a year, and yet is somehow pregnant. As if the day couldn't get any worse, the angel Gabriel and Lucifer both turn up to claim parentage. A belligerent ex-boyfriend, a baby-fearing best friend, and the weird kid from high school complete the riotous mix of irreverent characters, in a drama that challenges more than just your faith.

Director Sabrina Poole says: "Immaculate is consistently rude, frequently absurd, sometimes serious and features a lot of Hobnob biscuits. But as well as being bright and fun, it does actually ask some deep questions, using humour as the vehicle. How should a modern woman cope with immaculate conception? What would the arrival of a new Messiah do to the world? How do you discipline the Son of God? OK, not all deep – but still a good question".

Immaculate was first performed at the Edinburgh fringe in 2005. It has been both lauded and loathed by critics, often at the same time: "This play is carved out for those who can truly appreciate witty one-liners, bitter sarcasm, over-the-top slapstick, relentless swearing and even somewhat childish humour" (Varsity). It goes without saying (but we will say it nevertheless) that this production does, of course, exclusively focus on the brilliance - thanks to our extremely talented cast and crew. Lottie Askew plays our put-upon protagonist Mia, whilst Richard Vojvoda is her short-tempered former lover, Michael. Playing the angel Gabriel and Lucifer are familiar Barn faces Will Harragan and Séan Bennett; Rebekah Igneczi plays Rebecca, Mia's friend with a guilty conscience. Finally, Julian Newton is the one and only Gary Goodman.



As our friends and members will have heard by now, we were very sad that we needed to cancel our production of *The Clearing*, planned for our February/March slot. However, we fully intend to return to this production in a future season, with director Chris Bealey at the helm.

We are delighted to be replacing this show with one of the casualties of the COVID pandemic. *Amy's View* had been fully cast and was well into rehearsals when the first lockdown was imposed in March 2020. We have been able to obtain the rights to the show for this new set of performance dates; the majority of Pip's original cast and crew are ready, willing and excited to have the chance to recreate the production; and we know that this will be a wonderful and moving production.



About the show

'You know Amy's view: you have to love people. You just have to love them. You have to give love without any conditions at all. Just give it.'

1979 and Esme is at the height of her career as an actress in the West End although life is becoming increasingly difficult for those making a living on the stage. The visit of her daughter, Amy, with her new boyfriend, Dominic, an arts journalist, sets in motion a series of events which only reach their conclusion many years later.

A deeply affecting play from one of the nation's foremost playwrights, *Amy's View* explores marriage, love, fame, fidelity, betrayal and loss through the mother-daughter relationship and makes a case for both personal and artistic integrity and the importance of theatre itself.

We were thrilled with the success of *Queers* back in January 2023. First-time director Michelle Hutchings and her splendid cast and crew were rightly praised highly for this sensitive, dramatic, moving and important presentation of Mark Gatiss' 2017 curation of monologues. They traced the gay community across the last century to mark the 50th anniversary of the passing of the Sexual Offences Act 1967, and our production also included a specially-created extra piece about a transgender character, co-written and performed by Jen Alexander.

And since you can't keep a good woman down, I'm still part of the Barn team. I'm in charge of props and this season, I've taken on the role of Front of House Manager. I also hope to continue to direct in future seasons. This is a brilliant theatre and long may it continue to shine!"
